Dobra Fabryka Foundation, an independent Polish humanitarian and development organisation, is built on the belief that every life matters. Since 2014, we have been working tirelessly to bring hope, food, education, medical care, and job opportunities to those who need it most.

A mother struggling to feed her child.
A doctor in a warzone trying to save lives with dwindling supplies. A young child dreaming of an education but held back by poverty.

### **Hope Begins With You**

They say that the flapping of the wings of a butterfly can be felt on the other side of the world.

We know for certain that a cry of Grace, who hasn't had anything to eat in a small village in Kabaya, deep in the Democratic Republic of Congo, can set off a chain of events that, weeks later, leaves dozens of people clinging to a sinking raft in the middle of the Aegean Sea.

But we also know this: the smallest act of kindness—spare change in your pocket, a moment of compassion—can stop that chain reaction.

It can keep that little child, who is only 6 months old, from starving, wipe away her mother's tears, and give her a future where fleeing into the unknown is no longer the only way to survive.

There are so many places where danger outnumbers opportunity. For 10 years now, Dobra Fabryka has been in places, where danger outnumbers opportunity, where hunger, war, and climate change shatter lives, to restore dignity, rebuild hope. And this would not be possible without you.

At Dobra Fabryka, we believe that the only way to face the brutal reality of poverty is not to cover our ears and change the subject. We have power. Like the flutter of a butterfly's wings, we can set change in motion—turning despair into a smile, wiping away tears, putting a warm meal on the table, offering shelter, and giving people the tools to rebuild their lives.

Thank you for standing with us. Thank you for believing that hope is worth fighting for.




































#### 2024 was far from peaceful for the island of Lesbos. At first, it seemed like the number of migrants was declining, but in the second half

# Aid for Refugees on the Island of Lesbos





In 2024, the Home for All kitchen prepared 117 000 meals, reaching not only the sick, pregnant women, and children in the camp but also two day-care centers supporting the local community, including people with disabilities.

#### Moreover:

- We financed medical visits and tests for those most in need.
- We covered ongoing legal fees, passport costs, and travel expenses for refugees eligible for relocation.

Our aid for the people in the camp and smaller refugee centers in Greece amounted to

"I was a metalworker in Nigeria, but here I am no one," says John. From a pile of random objects, he pulls out a plastic chair and a wooden stool for himself. Embarrassed, he explains his habit of collecting things.

"In winter, we lacked everything. We barely managed to get wooden pallets and made a floor in the tent so we wouldn't have to sleep in a huge puddle that formed in the middle of it after each rainfall."

John invites us for tea and to hear the story of a journey that ended in the trap of European barbed wire.

"Thanks to my skills,
I traveled all over the
world. I had an exhibition
in the United States
and in many European
capitals. I also visited
Kraków (Poland) once."

"Where would you like to return?"

"To Nigeria, to my home, but that's impossible," he explains with resignation.

"I lost everything when my government forced me to flee. I don't blame Europe for welcoming me differently than before. I blame the authorities of my country because it was they who took away my dignity, opportunities, and future."

Together with you, we extend a hand to refugees. **Our goal is to restore their dignity.** 



## Greece

### Home Village Agricultural Garden








Our project in Greece is no longer just Home for All – a restaurant and kitchen that has been **feeding refugees** from the very first moments of their arrival on the island, run by the Greek couple Katerina and Nikos. It is also **Home Village, a farm** where we provide refugees with jobs. Here, they learn farming skills and supply the local market with organic fruits and vegetables.

In 2024, the Home Village farm **employed 22 people**, including 10 permanent workers. This demonstrates that they are not looking for constant aid but for opportunities to learn, work, and **support their families themselves**.







# Olive oil production

We launched a craft olive oil production facility, producing the highest quality oil, made by refugees and pressed exclusively using traditional methods.

We also purchased our own olive press, allowing us to extract the oil within just 6 hours of harvesting.



Ten of our beneficiaries work on producing NIKA olive oil. They are paid fairly for their work, which allows them to become part of the local community.

Knowing that the olive oil they produce with great dedication is gaining recognition abroad gives them a renewed sense of purpose.

# Emergency Humanitarian Aid for the victims of flood

The southeastern corner of the country saw more rain in three days than they usually get in a year.

9 people lost their lives, and thousands were displaced.

Around 13 000 homes were destroyed or severely damaged.

For many in Poland, September 2024 became a month of unimaginable loss. The rain came suddenly and relentlessly, turning quiet streets into raging rivers. Many families watched helplessly as the water crept closer, inching into their homes, then rising faster than they had imagined. Parents rushed to gather what they could, carrying their children to safety as floodwaters swallowed streets. Elderly residents, unable to evacuate in time, waited on upper floors, hoping rescue teams would reach them before the currents became too strong.

In the affected villages, **entire neighborhoods vanished** under muddy waves. Farmers stood helplessly as their fields, the source of their livelihood, were washed away overnight.



As floodwaters swallowed homes and livelihoods, we launched an emergency fundraiser, calling on those who, like us, refused to stand idly by while entire communities were left with nothing. We had to act. And act fast.

And as soon as the waters receded, we set out southbound, toward places the headlines barely mentioned but where the need was greatest. Bodzanów. Rudawa. Villages where mud still clung to walls, where the air was thick with silence, broken only by the quiet sound of people sifting through what was left of their homes. We walked past collapsed fences, waterlogged furniture dragged onto the streets, and cars washed miles away.

We had to do everything in our power for those who lost it all.

The aid we provided for the victims of the 2024 flood in Poland amounts to

€48 131

The news headlines may have faded, but our work continues. In 2025, we are still allocating the funds raised to help flood-affected communities rebuild and recover.

# Coordination and crisis management in the flooded areas

In the first days of the flood, we took on the coordination of crisis management, overseeing volunteer efforts and distributing material aid.

With relief supplies arriving from across Poland, the team prioritized organization, directing donations efficiently and placing volunteers where they were needed most. This ensured aid reached the hardest-hit communities without waste or delays, maximizing the impact of every contribution.

## Presence of the Team on-site resulted in:

- Identifying the essential needs of residents, including those related to necessary cleanup work on their properties
- Delivering aid to the most affected families in the form of packages containing food, cleaning supplies, personal hygiene products, and essential items such as clothing, small household appliances, mattresses, bedding, and towels
- Providing basic emergency psychological support to those in greatest need
- Coordinating the reconstruction of access to properties to ensure the passability of the county road
- Sorting the huge influx of material aid
- Disposal of large items and hazardous waste,
   e.g. raw meat; securing a propane-butane tank
   (1 000 liters) that was three-quarters full.



"The little princess's face was pale, and her eyes were wide open with a look of childish fear."

In front of one of the houses in Bodzanów lies a book. Tolstoy. War and Peace. The flood read it. It leafed through it with its wet paws, back and forth. It threw it out of some house along with the furniture, pots, and the neatly arranged, predictable everyday life.

"But how?"

"I don't know. I won't get a second life, and this one won't be enough for that."

Containers are driving by.
Everything goes to the
waste disposal. Family
memorabilia, shattered
mirrors, and worn-out

memories to the trash. Only
the aching walls and
broken plaster are left
behind.


But it's not over yet.



# Winter Warm Kits for the homeless

In 2024, as part of our annual Winter Warm Kit initiative, we partnered with the Warsaw Municipal Guard, who helped us deliver critically needed support for those without home. With temperatures dropping below 0°C, these people have no roof above their heads, and urgently need warm things to survive.


We have distributed 260 personalised kits for vulnerable people, who are living on the streets. These included jackets, hoodies, shoes, scarves, hats, gloves, sleeping bags, thermoses, and ready-to-eat meals. Additionally, we provided the Municipal Guard with a vast selection of new warm clothing, which they will share with the homeless during intervention patrols.

## Ukraine



### **Emergency Humanitarian aid** close to the frontline





In Ukraine, war does not pause, and neither do we. Every day, families wake up to shattered homes, empty cupboards, and the deafening silence of uncertainty. Since February 24th 2022 we are standing with the victims of war in Ukraine -not only as an organisation, but as a promise that no one facing war and hardship is ever truly alone.

When frontline communities were cut off from supplies, we delivered life-saving food kits, ensuring that those who stayed behind—too frail, too old, or too vulnerable to leave had something warm to eat. something to hold on to. In 2024 we have been supporting more than 550 vulnerable families living in the areas within 16 km from the frontline in Donetsk oblast with the essential food kits.

When hospitals ran out of critical supplies, we brought emergency medical consumables and essential equipment to doctors fighting to save lives in critically important hospitals in the East of Ukraine. In places where resources were stretched to the breaking point, we ensured that life-saving treatments continued.



Thanks to the ongoing support of our European partners and donors, we have delivered tens of thousands of medical consumables, including dressings, infusion sets, catheters, that served more than 25 000 patients.

As winter arrived, we knew that freezing temperatures could be just as deadly as war itself. So we provided winterization support, delivering warm blankets, thermoses, torches, and power banks—small but powerful tools that made the difference for their survival in these suffering times. Additionally, we provided power generators and recharging stations to the medical facilities in Dnipropetrovsk oblast, that allow the doctors to keep on treating patients, despite the power shortages.

None of this would have been possible without you.

Because of you, a mother in Donetsk found warmth for her child. A doctor in Dnipro had the tools to save a life. A person with disabilities did not have to choose between food and medicine.

This is not just humanitarian work.

This is the power of standing together.

Thank you for believing that even in war, there is hope. And thank you for being part of it.

But beyond aid, we did something just as important. We connected the dots. In a response too often fragmented and chaotic, we played a key role in coordination—ensuring that help reached the right people, that resources were not wasted, that humanitarian efforts built upon each other instead of overlapping or failing to meet urgent gaps. We made a difference not just in what we delivered, but in how aid, humanitarian response, was structured, ensuring no one was left behind.

### Our Coordination Achievements

We have established robust cooperation with over 100 organisations, including UN agencies, international NGOs, fellow local NGOs and CSOs and local and national authorities, ensuring a unified, effective response. We truly make the response more meaningful in the context of daily attacks, assistance to the organisations through various modalities.

#### **Emergency Guidelines**

We have created Emergency Guidelines, that has been daily used since May 2023 by all organisations providing multi-purpose cash assistance in response to missile attacks, evacuations and other shocks in East and South of Ukraine, it has also been the operational quide for the organisations to provide assistance to more than 40 000 people affected by the Kakhovka dam destruction in 2023.

#### Referral Tool


We have created a unique data-protection and Accountability to Affected Populations-centered referral tool, allowing multiple organisations to refer in a safe manner vulnerable beneficiaries to ensure their varied needs are covered. The use of the tool is currently being scaled up across UN agencies, International and National NGOs through various assistance modalities.

As the first and only local NGO co-chairing Working Group or Coordination cluster in Ukraine Response, we have been elected to co-lead the Cash Working Group Task Team on Deduplication, Registration and Interoperability, within which we have developed Standard Operating Procedures used by more than 110 organisations, that have prevented duplication of Multi Purpose Cash assistance for more than 2 mln people.

### Hospital in Ntamugenga

In the village of
Ntamugenga, deep in
North Kivu province, **Dobra Fabryka runs a lifeline**—
a hospital that continues
to serve those in urgent
need despite the relentless
fighting between the army
and rebels forces, that rage
on just 40 kilometers away
from it, claiming countless
lives—including those
of children.

Yet, thanks to our donors, this hospital keeps on bringing hope. We have ensured a steady supply of medication, covering 90% of the facility's needs.

#### **Hospital in numbers:**

- We saved nearly 6 500 people suffering from malaria, 2 850 of whom were children under the age of 5
- · We provided 13 110 outpatient consultations
- · We hospitalized 3 067 patients
- · We performed **489 blood transfusions**
- · We assisted in 920 births
- We performed 354 surgical operations
- We carried out over 3 600 minor surgical procedures and provided thousands of dressings, injections, vaccinations, tooth extractions, and other treatments




Hundreds of thousands of people, **mostly children**, lose their lives to malaria every year. Not a shark, not a tiger—the mosquito remains the deadliest creature on Earth.

Malaria constantly evolves, mutating and taking a deadly toll on the most vulnerable. A moment of malnutrition, stress, or weakness—and one unlucky mosquito bite can be fatal.

We are saving children from death, one life at a time. One of those in 2024 was Jenny's life. The moment a child with malaria reaches our hospital doors, the whole team jumps into action, deploying the lifesaving arsenal you made possible—quinine, blood, oxygen, and vital IV drips.

# Democratic Republic of the Congo

### **Nutrition Center in Ntamugenga**



The nutrition center at our St. Raphael Hospital in Ntamugenga is one of its kind in the entire North Kivu province in the extent how well it is equipped.

While the intensity of fighting in the region decreased in 2024, hunger continues to take away lives.

We provide assistance to the young children diagnosed with malnutrition, which can lead to deadly starvation.

We also deliver life-saving food to the most vulnerable patients, including those with disabilities, tuberculosis, AIDS.

Each year, we save about 500 children from starvation disease.

#### Our Results in Numbers:

In 2024 in Ntamugenga, we helped:

- 124 children recover from severe malnutrition
- 380 children recover from moderate malnutrition

Weekly, we treat 75-80 children suffering from starvation-related diseases.

"We have a two-year-old boy from Kabaya, Joseph" says Sister Agnieszka, who works in the center. Even before we saw his picture, we knew that this will be a child in a critical condition.

The nutrition center in Ntamugenga has seen many faces of hunger. In 2024, one image stayed with us—a two-year-old boy, his fragile body covered in gentian violet, too weak to ask for food, his eyes empty as he watched the staff in silence.

We were there for him, we fought for him –

- even if he no longer believed himself that he would ever be able to be a child again.

## **Rwanda**

Hospice in Kabuga





Dobra Fabryka supports the first and, so far, only hospice in Rwanda, run by the Polish Congregation of the Sisters of Angels.

The patients come to us for several months, more often – for a few days, several hours. Several priceless hours, during which we can **lift them from** the world of hopelessness to the world of hope.

#### Our results in numbers:

- In 2024, we provided care for 33 palliative patients.
- We also continuously support 27 children of members of the hospice staff, deceased patients, and impoverished families, including renting accommodation and covering their life expenses.
- We procured 20 specialised hospital beds, worth over €31 000, which were delivered in the hospital in February 2025.





She regained her strength thanks to the incredible team and the treatment at the hospice: physiotherapy, a proper diet, comfortable conditions.

Before Geoffry came to our care, no one knew how to help a child who wasn't growing. Here, he was diagnosed with a growth hormone deficiency, which causes fluid to accumulate in different parts of his body. Our hospice provides care fully adapted to Geoffry's special needs, including his blindness. Here, he receives rehabilitation and proper nutrition.

Especially for him, we **brought a feeding bottle** from Poland that mimics a mother's breast to help feed him. We don't know how much time he has left, but **we are doing everything to make sure every hour is lived well.** 



# **Burkina Faso**

### **Agricultural Project in the** Village of Gourcy







In the small village of Gourcy in northern Burkina Faso, we established an agricultural cooperative, funded a mill and a vegetable garden, dug wells, and set up a tailoring school. We teach children and adults reading, writing, and arithmetic, all in an effort to provide work for dozens of families living in harsh, almost desert-like conditions.

A few years ago, we started helping the residents of Gourcy by teaching them entrepreneurship and providing the necessary tools to allow them to grow the resources entrusted to them.

Back in 2016 it all began with a simple starter kit. Ten families, selected by our Head of Mission Małgosia Tomaszewska, received livestock from us, and we built pens for them. Our beneficiaries were also supplied with seeds for planting and farming tools.



The task was simple. After one year, each family was expected to pay it forward by providing another family in need with a similar set of resources. Their first responsibility was to grow and multiply what they had received—expanding their livestock, harvesting crops, and making their farms thrive. Everything beyond what they passed on to another family was pure profit for them.

Today, dozens of families are participating in the project, and we have every reason to be proud. The project is working, and in this small village, the good continues to grow.

We provide jobs to 45 families who cultivate the vegetable garden we established

### The vegetable garden in 2024:

We harvested crops, and the proceeds from their sale allowed us to purchase more vegetable seeds. Part of these earnings contributed to the microloan fund, which is now used by garden workers to develop their own businesses.

The women who, after a year, passed on the starter kits (animals and plant seeds) to other families also participated in a soumbala spice production training funded by us.

We also provided them with 100 kg of soumbala seeds to help them start their work.





The irrigation system we created is the heart of the vegetable garden. It requires regular maintenance.

We purchased a new gas cylinder that allows water to be pumped into the tanks through a motor pump. We also bought a hose to connect the wells to the tanks.


### Vegetable garden maintenance and development





We financed inspections of the pumps, cleaning, and maintenance.

We deepened another well, renovated the water tanks, and strengthened the solar panels.



Families didn't have enough food for themselves.

Today, this place proves a simple idea – if you share, you will always have enough.

Every day, we see that these words are true.

The story of the village of Gourcy is a story about people, not numbers. People like Alimata, for whom each sold ball of sumbala represents independence, security, and restored dignity.

The journey to this day was not easy, but today she can celebrate success.

# **Burkina Faso**

# Education for children and adults





In September, we contributed to the cost of purchasing **school supplies for 50 children** from families in Gourcy who are participating in the project.

Aid is essential, but we also ensure that parents feel responsible for their children and manage their household budget wisely. Therefore, a small portion of the school supplies is covered by the parents themselves.

School education in Burkina Faso includes learning about agriculture, tree planting, caring for livestock, managing water wisely, and the basics of healthy nutrition.

The school supplies provided to the children are a prerequisite for participating in education and a step toward independence in the adult lives of our beneficiaries.







In October 2024, a new group of 21 girls began their studies at a 3-year tailoring school.

The students starting their education received t-shirts and skirts made by their senior schoolmates from the 2nd and 3rd years.

In a country where only about 45% of people over the age of 15 can read, having a trade enables them to support themselves and their families independently.

Throughout the school year, 16 girls continued their studies in the 2nd year, and 10 girls were in the 3rd year. The top four graduates received sewing machines from us, which can enable them to start their own tailoring businesses. The remaining students were provided with other

sewing tools.

During the schoolyear, we regularly supplied the students with materials, threads, and tools, while also taking care of machine maintenance.

All groups of girls also participated in a **literacy course**.




In 2024, all graduates of the school funded by Dobra Fabryka found employment on the same day—job market demand is extremely high. That same month, another 28 students began their studies.

Nine students who reported vision problems received funding for eye exams and glasses, which are essential for their education and future work.

At school, the girls participate in culinary, sewing, IT, English, and economics classes. The curriculum has also been expanded to include new subjects: the production of detergents and cosmetics, as well as herbal medicine.

In 2024, we allocated **€26 118**to the project in Senegal









## **Mauritania**

#### **Nutrition Center in Kaédi**



Dobra Fabryka supports a nutrition center for children in the town of Kaédi. Two staff members, nearly a hundred children each week, excellent organization—yet until now, no regular funding.

For years, the center has been overseen by nuns, with occasional help from the local bishop. His support was invaluable, but the center needed steady assistance.

We launched a support program for women to help them prepare meals for children, significantly improving their eating habits. We teach mothers how to adjust diets to better encourage their children to try new foods.

In addition to providing food support, we built a house for one of the poorest families in our care.

#### Our results in numbers:

In 2024, the center took care of 254 children.

Within this group, we helped:

- 72 children recover from acute malnutrition
- 80 children recover from moderate malnutrition

Each year, we save around 150 children from starvation disease.

# In 2024, our aid for the patients of the Kaédi nutrition center amounted to

€13 654

Kasoun's family hadn't eaten breakfast, and they had nothing for lunch either. Whether they'd have something for dinner depended on luck. If someone at the market noticed the fabric the mother dyed, she would have enough to buy some rice or couscous. She would divide it into equal portions, ensuring no one ate too much and no one went hungry.

Kasoun is her youngest son. He's 4 months old and suffers from hunger.

The woman knows she should eat properly because only then will she be able to feed him, but there are five of them at home.

She can't eat better than her children; she wouldn't be able to bear their looks.

She brought Kasoun to the nutrition center in Kaédi.

She was ashamed to ask for help, but the Franciscan sisters didn't need to be asked. They knew she was embarrassed and what she needed. She received formula for the baby, returned home, and told her oldest daughter to guard it like holy scripture.







# Togo

### Pharmacy in Saoudé

Our pharmacy is located in Saoudé, an extremely poor area in the north of Togo. The sick receive medication from us in exchange for only a bowl of corn. The collected grain is distributed during the dry season to those who have nothing to eat.

We have supplied the pharmacy with all the necessary medicines. Our support has reached 3 750 people. The sick are arriving from increasingly distant areas.

In August, we invited an interior architect to Saoudé to assess how we can transform the pharmacy building into a clinic. Architectural plans are being created.

Currently, performing a basic examination, like an ultrasound, requires traveling to the capital, which is 400 km away. We dream of having specialists visit the renovated facility to examine the local population.

In 2024, we provided a total of

€9 506 to maintain the pharmacy in Togo



A young mother of three girls. We sent her for a psychiatric consultation, suspecting epilepsy. This diagnosis was confirmed by the psychiatrist. We ensure that Susanne has regular visits to the psychiatrist, covering the cost of all medications and additional tests.

The boy suffered from sickle cell anemia. We took him to the capital for hematology consultations, where effective medication was prescribed. Marcel is under constant pharmacological and nutritional care. In 2023, he started education at an agricultural school, the costs of which we continue to cover. We also finance his stay in the dormitory and all meals.

Regine asked for help, saving she didn't understand what was happening. The problem turned out to be psychiatric disorders. We provide psychiatric care and fully cover the cost of her daily medication. Every 2-3 months, she has check-ups. In 2024, we also funded gynecological and ophthalmological tests and treatments.





# Bangladesh



Rohingya Refugee Camp • Project for Families



With a population density of 40 000 people per square kilometer, the refugee camp in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, is one of the most overcrowded places on Earth. For the past six years, we have been working to reduce hunger and suffering among Rohingya families.

Among them are single mothers and elderly women who struggle to navigate the overwhelming system of the camp.

Throughout 2024, we continued to provide essential food aid. improving the limited camp diet for 28 of the most vulnerable.

We also covered the costs of medical treatment. clothing, books, and school fees for the children.



We allocated support to 9 families throughout the year, totaling

€10 500

"In my free time, I would sit with my grandchildren and tell them stories. Our house was beautiful, solid, and big. The garden felt like something out of a fairy tale. I wish I could go back, but there is nothing left to return to. There is no house in Myanmar, no village anymore," says Suruzzol.

The largest refugee camp in the world cries at night.

During the day, there is no time for memories. The Rohingya fight for **survival** in the nearly one-million-strong ghetto near Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh.

Deprived of any rights, even those granted to refugees, they remain in their makeshift huts.

We have been supporting Suruzzol for seven years. All we can do is make sure she doesn't die of hunger. We remind her that she matters by asking for her stories—the ones she once told her grandchildren. We cannot change anything else. However, only with our help does she have a chance to live to see the day when freedom and home are not just a distant memory.

## **Pharmacy for Those in Need**

In Lebanon, which is facing one of the worst economic crises in the world, the Dobra Fabryka has been providing daily support to the sick and the poor since September 2021. These are people who wouldn't survive another month without help.

"People have no means of living. There is a shortage of food, fuel, and basic medications, and the price of a pack of paracetamol is beyond reach for the average Lebanese person," says Dr. Elias. Elias is a dentist. In addition to working in his clinic, he has been running the "Adventure of Charity" association for 20 years, supporting the poorest in purchasing medicines.

Together with the Association, we care for 250 people in need, regularly providing them with:

- life-saving medications for chronic illnesses
- food and basic hygiene and sanitary products.

#### Moreover:

- We provided 120 liters of heating oil per family to 70 families to help them survive the winter.
- We prepared Christmas packages with medicines and food for 250 people with chronic illnesses.
- We gifted 60 backpacks with school supplies for children.
- We supported the residents of Bikfaya by providing food rations and diesel fuel for 30 families, medications for 18 people with chronic illnesses, and covering school tuition for five families.

At the heart of helping is human connection. Loneliness turns even a simple conversation into a remedy. I visit the sick as a friend, always ready to listen.

We met Fawzi in a nursing home on the outskirts of Beirut. He had just turned 80 and was clearly suffering, moving with difficulty. His warmth and tenderness gave the impression he wanted to be invisible. Illness and Lebanon's bankruptcy had taken away his strength and joy for life. He had lost his wife.

He was left almost alone, with a 30-year-old disabled son cared for by another facility. The cost of fuel and transportation was so high that they could only see each other once a month. He eagerly awaited their meetings. The facility where Fawzi lived was barely making ends meet.



We helped him by providing medicines and food to alleviate his suffering, even if just a little. Thanks to the support of people like you, he didn't have to worry about basic needs.



## Lebanon

Aid for the Internally Displaced









In October 2024, war broke out between Lebanon and Israel, causing an unprecedented displacement of residents from the south.

Without hesitation, we decided to provide additional support to over **350**people—both Muslims and Christians
—in the towns of Ajaltoun and Bikfaya.


- We covered the cost of medical care for people with diabetes, asthma, and hypertension.
- We provided displaced people with food packages, water, sweets for the children, and essential hygiene supplies.
- We gathered clothes, blankets, and pillows for over 200 people.
- We purchased an industrial freezer,
   15 gas heaters, and equipment for one sick person: an electric hospital bed and a wheelchair.

In 2024, we allocated a total of

€43 065

to the project in Lebanon





### Smile in The Box

The conflict between Israel and Lebanon forced **over 400 000 children** to leave their homes. Families found shelter in temporary centers or on the streets. At the same time, the functioning of essential services, such as schools and healthcare, was severely disrupted, exposing children to health issues, educational challenges, and emotional trauma.

Together with the Smile in the Box initiative, we responded to this crisis by funding:

- 3 000 backpacks, 1 000 of which contained food, clothing, educational materials, and hygiene supplies
- 1950 coloring books
- 2 500 toys
- Support for families with young children: milk and diapers.

In addition, we were one of the sponsors of a Christmas event for 700 children, which included a visit from Santa, entertainment, and gifts.
